
THE RED FLOWER





What Are Rendering Engines?

A render engine is what we use in 3D applications and games to render the objects in 3D space complete with textures, materials and lighting. It is essentially used to create a final image that we can view on our 2D screens. Creating a sequence of these images lets you create movies.

We have two very different ways rendering scenes, both widely used for different purposes.

These two different types of engines are:

Ray Tracers: as the name suggests, uses virtual light rays to simulate light bounces. The light bounces help to create physically accurate shadows and handles light much better. The more the number of bounces or samples the better or less noisy the image is. The light is bouncing off of the 3D models that you are using, complex



scenes that require a lot of objects with a high polygon count will take longer to render. Ray tracers can give very realistic lifelike results which is why they are used in big budget Hollywood movies.

The popular ray tracing engines are Cycles, Octane, and Arnold, each with their own merits.

Real time engines: also called gaming engines, are incredibly fast but also
not tend to be very realistic. They approximate shadows by using geometry
data. They create 2D images by projecting 3D objects onto a plane using
simple mathematical transformations. Modern game engines are very
concerned with performance instead of realism either to save resources or to
due to artistic choices.

For gaming it is very desirable to have higher frame rates, not only does the videos look smoother, it also aids professional gamers in competitive gaming, games like CS:GO benefit greatly as with faster response times.

Examples would be the Unity game engine, Unreal Engine, CryEngine, Blender's new Eevee renderer.

Kotlin: the Future of app development

Kotlin is a free and open source programming language designed by JetBrains. It's been in development since 2010 and has been ready for use in production since February 2016. In fact, many highly regarded companies have already incorporated Kotlin into their production applications. JetBrains mentioned that adoption is roughly a 50 / 50 split between Android and back-end JVM server applications. In fact, adoption rates are so high that it's predicted to overtake



Java for Android development within a year. This will make an impact on the type of skills that will be in demand.

Kotlin compiles to Java bytecode and runs on the JVM so it's suitable for all environments where Java is used. This includes Android as well as back-end server applications. Kotlin is also interoperable with Java in both directions. This allows companies to leverage their existing investments in Java as well as the large collection of open source Java libraries without needing to re-write anything. Kotlin classes can work alongside Java classes and although not required, Java classes can even be automatically converted to Kotlin which enables a very gentle learning curve. When working inside a Java class, Kotlin classes are exposed in a Java-friendly way and vice versa.

Kotlin can also compile to native (e.g. for iPhone), JavaScript or WebAssembly for the front end, and even Gradle build scripts can now be written in Kotlin. The idea of

implementing the back-end, front-end, and build script all in one language is very promising. Although Kotlin on the front-end sounds strange at first, the benefits are similar to why companies choose TypeScript but with many more guarantees.


Kotlin also supports writing business logic as multi-platform libraries which can be shared across the back-end, Android mobile app, or even web front-end. A common best practice is to perform input validation on both the front end and back-end so being able to define the validation and utility functions in only 1 place is nice. The duplicate development and test automation effort for each platform can now be reused instead. This also ensures that all platforms have consistent business logic behavior.

Converting a Java application to Kotlin is expected to reduce the line count by 40% according to Jetbrains. Note that this isn't accomplished by jamming more code on each line as the average line length is also reduced. Combined, this means that the total amount of code can be reduced by over 50% when leveraging the capabilities of Kotlin.

There are three main reasons for the code reduction. The first reason is due to a more concise language (eg. Kotlin data classes can replace 50 line classes with a single line). The second reason is that the Kotlin standard library enhances existing Java classes with extensions that trivialize common usage (eg. splitting a collection of items based on some custom condition or checking if a collection contains an item with certain qualities etc.). The last reason is very surprising. Kotlin actually enables higher levels of code re-use that are completely impossible in Java even when using

Java 8 features. Although both languages are Turing complete, Kotlin allows you to extract more re-usable patterns than what Java allows.

Therefore, converting a Java application to Kotlin and taking advantage of Kotlin features reduces code size by 50%. The code is also much easier to understand because the extra Kotlin capabilities allow you to



think using higher level concepts. The possible states of the application at any given point are also reduced which reduces the possibilities that need to be considered thus reducing the cognitive effort.

Filing and prosecuting a patent application in India – a Basic Primer

Types of Applications in India:

- Ordinary Application: First filed application in India. Could a provisional application followed by a complete specification within 12 months of filing of the provisional application. Otherwise, directly a complete specification may be filed.
- Convention Application: An Application under Paris Convention, taking priority
 of a patent application filed in a foreign country and filed within twelve months
 of the said foreign application.
- PCT National Phase Application: A national phase application can be filed within 31 months of the priority date or the international filing date, whichever is earlier.
- For invention by Indian residents, any patent application can be first filed outside India:
 - if a foreign filing permission is obtained from the Patent Office under Section 39, or
 - After expiry of six weeks from filing of a patent application for the invention before the Indian Patent Office.

Who can apply for patent in India:

- Natural person(s) and/or Startup
- Small entity, alone or with natural person(s) and/or Startup
- Large Entity, alone or with natural person(s) and/ or Startup and/or small entity. The patent on may be filed by the patent applicant himself or by duly authorized Registered Patent agent.

For the purpose of the Patents Act, a "Small Entity" is defined as:

- 1. An enterprise engaged in manufacture or production of goods where the investment in plant and machinery does not exceed INR 100 million; and
- 2. An enterprise engaged in providing or rendering of services where the investment in equipment is not more than INR 50 million.

Documents required for filing a patent application:

- Complete specification in English, with claims (if applicable) and drawings. In case of PCT National phase application, verified English translation of the PCT application. The application being filed must be same as that filed/amended before the PCT. The Amended Rules, 2016 allow for deletion of claims of the PCT while entering the Indian national phase.
- Power of Authority, if application is being filed through Patent Agent. Power can be filed within three months of filing the application
- Proof of right to make the application in India, if inventors are not the applicant for patent application. Proof of is to be filed within six months of filing the application.
- In case of PCT National phase applications, copy of PCT/IB/304 or priority document and verified English translation thereof, if applicable.
- Declaration of inventor ship.

 Details of all foreign applications filed for same or substantially the same invention, under Section 8(1) of the Patents Act

Publication: Happens under section 11A after 18 months from the priority date. Also, there is a provision for early publication upon request under Section 11A(2). Request for Examination: An application would not be considered for examination if the request is filed within the prescribed period of 48 months from priority date or filing date of the application, whichever is earlier. If the request is not filed, the application is considered as deemed to be withdrawn. Also, a provision for expedited examination (w.e.f. May 16, 2016) has been incorporated by inserting rule 24C for two specific category of applicant

- Who have filed a PCT application and selected India as the competent International Searching Authority or International Preliminary Authority; or
- A Startup

Examination of application: Happens under section 12. The Patent Office searches for anticipation of the claimed invention by previous publication/prior claiming under section 13 and checks compliance of other provisions of the Patents Act, and issues first statement of objections i.e. First Examination report (FER).

Reply to the first statement of objections: is required to be filed by applicant within six months from the date of issuance of FER. This period may be further extended by a period of three months on a request for extension accompanied by prescribed fee. Hearing: Before deciding adversely on any application, the Patent Office generally provides applicant with an opportunity being heard. The outstanding objections are indicated to the applicant by way of a notice of hearing. The applicant (through his agent) s required to settle all outstanding objections and file a written submission of his arguments pursuant to the hearing and within fifteen days of the hearing. Grant of Patent: If all requirements stand met, the application is placed in order for grant and a Patent Certificate is issued after making all relevant entries in the Register of Patents. Renewal fee accrues from third year (of filing) onwards but is payable only after grant of patent. Accumulated renewal fees is therefore required to be paid immediately grant and thereafter year until completion of twenty years from filing.

An Introduction to Blockchain

CRYPTOCURRENCYis the digital and virtual currency which has become popular in recent few years in forms of **Bitcoin**, **Ethereum**, **ripple** and so on. The pros of using cryptocurrency are **decentralization**, **peer to peer transactions**, **cryptographically secure and anonymous**etc. along with cons including globalization of unlawful activities like exchange of drugs, guns, animal's skin or any other prohibited article and promotion of many unauthorized activities in the form of cryptocurrency.

BLOCKCHAIN is the key technology behind cryptocurrency whose name itself indicates that blocks which are connected via chain. Blockchain consists of large number of blocks in which the entire data is stored and these blocks are distributed to a large number of computers worldwide which all are connected together. It works similarly like Bank which keeps and maintains records of all the customers, their transactions but the major difference is that in blockchain, the entire records are maintained on all the computers available on network not on any superior computer which makes it a reliable technology.

To enter into a blockchain, there is always a *public and private key*which are somewhat similar to account number and passwords respectively. In blockchain, each and every block has a unique address which is calculated on the basis of the data present in the previous block. So, if a person makes any changes in the data at any block then the address of all the blocks followed to that one generates a huge error requiring theinvolvement of 51% of the computers on the network to tackle this.

To add a new block in a blockchain, it requires a lot of computing power and a particular mathematical problem is solved for the same which is referred to as "MINING". In every 10 minutes, a new block is added.

Blockchain facilitates us with -

"Security" i.e. if data is changed then, it needs to be updated on 51% of the computers on the network so no one has an authority to falsify the data.

"Distributive" - there is no central authority or any govt. body to inspect the transactions which are being processed.


"No superiority" as no computer on network is superior being a distributed ledger .

"**Non-trackable**" as the person or group involved in blockchain are not authorized so they can never be tracked on a blockchain.

The history of Bitcoin indeed makes everyone avid because it is believed that Satoshi Nakamoto discovered Bitcoin but nevertheless it is an unknown identity. It is completely OPEN SOURCE and it is said that Only 21 million bitcoins can exist in a blockchain. The chain which has the longest length in blockchain comes in consideration and other chains are appended at the end of the longest one.

Later on ,a new concept was initiated in the blockchain which is known as **SMART CONTRACT**. These are the programs which are executed automatically

when a transaction takes place along with the signature of both the person involved in that .It has an owner and a life cycle .The ecosystem that allows to create a new smart contract and store permanently them into a blockchain is known as **ETHEREUM**. The cryptocurrency involved in Ethereum blockchain is known as **ETHER.** It has various applications like flight delay insurance, truly autonomous car and many more.



Another term used in this domain is **WALLETS** which is basically an application used to store multiple accounts at a single place and maintains the records of entire transaction made within each blockchain along with respective private and public key for the same.

Blockchain has given a scope to start ups and developing companies to create their own cryptocurrency and sell them in Bitcoin market as cryptocurrency exchange in a similar way like a stock market worksto develop and expand their business.

With exchange cryptocurrency, companies offers some benefits to the buyer in order to sell their coins in the Bitcoin market. All the transactions are carried out within the blockchain for that particular currency and each of the coin is created by the company itself . This is referred to as *ICO (INITIAL COIN OFFERING)* which has become an alternative to **IPO (INITIAL PUBLIC OFFERING)** and private venture in which the company has to offer its shares to the public and requires a lot of Govt. verification to be the part of stock market.

We can say that Blockchain offers various notable features which are being misused but if we implement it in a fruitful way thenit can boost up each and every sector which are way behind than their expected growth.



OPTICAL NETWORKS - NEAR FUTURE

The rapid development of multiple applications and the continuous demand for network bandwidth has significantly hiked during the past decade. The WDM (wavelength-division multiplexing) technology has already being implemented proving immense bandwidth by using parallel wavelength channels. But unfortunately, the overall network spectrum efficiency is severely decreased by the fixed grid definition and standard line rate transmission. The only solution is to go for GRIDLESS /FLEXIBLE SPECTRUM allocation by introducing ELASTIC OPTICAL NETWORK (EON). The crux of word ELASTIC refers to flexible-grid channel allocation; and the longer-term solution involves extending the fiber capacity by space division multiplexing (SDM) based on new types of fibers supporting multiple cores. For short-term evolution, it is possible to one-time upgrade to full flexible-grid technology on the entire network, which means, before the current optical transport network capacity is exhausted, the current fixed-grid network would be maximally kept operational during the migration to preserve the already-made investment. The migration strategies evolving from fixed-grid to flexible-grid, SDM based Reconfigurable Optical Add/Drop Multiplexers (ROADMs), together with networking aspects of routing and spectrum resource allocation are in focus. Therefore, the future lies in Elastic Optical Network

Early Management Theory

Managers in the early 1900s had very few external resources to draw upon to guide and develop their management practice. But thanks to early theorists like Henri Fayol (1841-1925), managers began to get the tools they needed to lead and manage more effectively. Fayol, and others like him, are responsible for building the foundations of modern management theory.

Henri Fayol was born in Istanbul in 1841. When he was 19, he began working as an engineer at a large mining company in France. He eventually became the director, at a time when the mining company employed more than 1,000 people.

Through the years, Fayol began to develop what he considered to be the 14 most important principles of management. Essentially, these explained how managers should organize and interact with staff.



In 1916, two years before he stepped down as director, he published his "14 Principles of Management" in the book "Administration Industrielle et Générale." Fayol also created a list of the six primary functions of management, which go hand in hand with the Principles.

Fayol's "14 Principles" was one of the earliest theories of management to be created, and remains one of the most comprehensive. He's considered to be among the most influential contributors to the modern concept of management, even though people don't refer to "The 14 Principles" often today.

Fayol's 14 Principles of Management

Fayol's principles are listed below:

Division of Work – When employees are specialized, output can increase because they become increasingly skilled and efficient.

Authority – Managers must have the authority to give orders, but they must also keep in mind that with authority comes responsibility.

Discipline – Discipline must be upheld in organizations, but methods for doing so can vary.

Unity of Command – Employees should have only one direct supervisor.

Unity of Direction – Teams with the same objective should be working under the direction of one manager, using one plan. This will ensure that action is properly coordinated.

Subordination of Individual Interests to the General Interest – The interests of one employee should not be allowed to become more important than those of the group. This includes managers.

Remuneration – Employee satisfaction depends on fair remuneration for everyone. This includes financial and non-financial compensation.

Centralization – This principle refers to how close employees are to the decision-making process. It is important to aim for an appropriate balance.

Scalar Chain – Employees should be aware of where they stand in the organization's hierarchy, or chain of command.

Order – The workplace facilities must be clean, tidy and safe for employees. Everything should have its place.


Equity – Managers should be fair to staff at all times, both maintaining discipline as

necessary and acting with kindness where appropriate.

Stability of Tenure of Personnel – Managers should strive to minimize employee turnover. Personnel planning should be a priority.

Initiative – Employees should be given the necessary level of freedom to create and carry out plans.

Esprit de Corps – Organizations should strive to promote team spirit and unity.

Management Engineering: The Next Big Thing

What is management engineering?

In the past, management engineers have designed systems for control. Today they are designing systems that support change. With this shift, there is also a switch from a project or department focus to a systems focus that inevitably involves multiple departments and disciplines. Management engineering utilizes industrial engineering knowledge and skills to provide internal



consulting services for all departments in an organization in order to develop, implement, and monitor more efficient, cost-effective business processes and strategies.

What do management engineers do?

Throughout the hospital environment, management engineers solve operational problems and improve levels of quality, service, or productivity. ME's work with members of a department or service line to develop recommendations for

improvement. They focus on improving the availability and validity of information used in analysis, decision making, and monitoring operations performance. Management engineers are called upon to determine the most efficient and effective way to run a hospital department.

What skills do management engineers use?

Management engineering focuses on basic industrial engineering skills. Observation, data collection, and statistical analysis play a vital role in any project.ME's serve as facilitators and technical advisors for projects ranging from staffing levels to new information system technologies combining communication skills with a strong technical background.

What types of projects do Management Engineers work on?

Management engineering uses a very participative approach in its projects. The ME department works on a wide variety of projects that can be classified into two major categories: quality improvement and management support.

Quality improvement projects focus on improving processes and systems by

evaluating the current system, determining root causes of problems, and developing recommendations for improvement.

These projects can include:

- Work flow design.
- · Scheduling of staff/patients.
- Organizational structure.
- Workload management.
- Inter-departmental coordination.
- Work methods and procedures.
- Defining workplace needs and designing physical workplace layouts.

Management support projects focus on improving decision making, problem solving, or planning.

- Designing questionnaires or other data collection tools.
- Statistical, mathematical, or graphical analysis.
- Cost benefit analysis.
- Design or implementation of departmental or hospital wide information systems.
- Developing systems to monitor the performance, costs, and effectiveness of operations.
- Analyzing the alternative solutions using computer simulation.

TIME MANAGEMENT

Developing time management skills is a journey

that may begin with this Guide, but needs practice and other guidance along the way. One goal is to help yourself become aware of how you use your time as one resource in organizing, prioritizing, and succeeding in your studies in the context of competing activities of friends, work, family, etc.

First: try our exercise in <u>time management</u>:

How do you spend your time each day?

Strategies on using time:

These applications of time management have proven to be effective as good study habits.

As we go through each strategy, jot down an idea of what each will look like for you:

Blocks of study time and breaks

As your school term begins and your course schedule is set, develop and plan for, blocks of study time in a typical week. Blocks ideally are around 50 minutes, but perhaps you become restless after only 30 minutes? Some difficult material may require more frequent breaks. Shorten your study blocks if necessary-but don't forget to return to the task at hand! What you do during your break should give you an opportunity to have a snack, relax, or otherwise refresh or re-energize yourself. For example, place blocks of time when you are most productive: are you a morning person or a night owl?

Jot down one best time block you can study. How long is it? What makes for a good break for you? Can you control the activity and return to your studies?

Dedicated study spaces

Determine a place free from distraction (no cell phone or text messaging!) where you can maximize your concentration and be free of the distractions that friends or hobbies can bring! You should also have a back-up space that you can escape to, like the library, departmental study centre, even a coffee shop where you can be anonymous. A change of venue may also bring extra resources.

What is the best study space you can think of? What is another?

Weekly reviews

Weekly reviews and updates are also an important strategy. Each week, like a Sunday night, review your assignments, your notes, your calendar. Be mindful that as deadlines and exams approach, your weekly routine must adapt to them!

What is the best time in a week you can review?

Prioritize your assignments

When studying, get in the habit of beginning with the most difficult subject or task. You'll be fresh, and have more energy to take them on when you are at

your best. For more difficult courses of study, try to be flexible: for example, build in reaction time when you can get feedback on assignments before they are due.

What subject has always caused you problems?

Achieve "stage one"--get something done!

The Chinese adage of the longest journey starting with a single step has a couple of meanings: First, you launch the project! Second, by starting, you may realize that there are some things you have not planned for in your process. Details of an assignment are not always evident until you begin the assignment. Another adage is that "perfection is the enemy of good", especially when it prevents you from starting! Given that you build in review, roughly draft your idea and get going! You will have time to edit and develop later.

What is a first step you can identify for an assignment to get yourself started?

• Postpone unnecessary activities until the work is done!

Postpone tasks or routines that can be put off until your school work is finished!

This can be the most difficult challenge of time management. As learners we always meet unexpected opportunities that look appealing, then result in poor performance on a test, on a paper, or in preparation for a task. Distracting activities will be more enjoyable later without the pressure of the test, assignment, etc. hanging over your head. Think in terms of pride of accomplishment. Instead of saying "no" learn to say "later".

What is one distraction that causes you to stop studying?

• Identify resources to help you

Are there tutors? An expert friend? Have you tried a keyword search on the Internet to get better explanations? Are there specialists in the library that can point you to resources? What about professionals and professional organizations. Using outside resources can save you time and energy, and solve problems.

Write down three examples for that difficult subject above? Be as specific as possible.

Use your free time wisely

Think of times when you can study "bits" as when walking, riding the bus, etc. Perhaps you've got music to listen to for your course in music appreciation, or drills in language learning? If you are walking or biking to school, when best to listen? Perhaps you are in a line waiting? Perfect for routine tasks like flash cards, or if you can concentrate, to read or review a chapter. The bottom line is to put your time to good use.

The abbreviation of LIFE that I believe in is:



Why! Why! Why can't we live in peace?


And learn to resolve the disputes with ease,

To Kill a Mockingbird - A review

The spectrum of human behaviour is vast and wide. While a part of the mob understands the extensiveness of it, most of us tend to turn a blind eye to what seems "abnormal" to us. Ironically, the subjectiveness of 'normality' is in itself is abstract. Dealing with such colourful personalities requires one to be equipped with certain skill set. And one learns these soft skills by the most efficient teacher - Life.

The epigraph of 'To Kill a Mockingbird' catches the essence of the story in the most beautiful manner. "Lawyers, I suppose, were children once."

For starters, the story is from the viewpoint of a child. It is through the viewpoint of Scout that Lee is able to present the story objectively. Scott paints the picture as it is: an innocent little girl making



racial remarks and regarding people of colour as the true reciprocal of the society. Had it been an adult character, the sense of propriety would have sugar coated the conversation.

Another inference of story in the epigraph can be traced to the moment when Jem questions his father (Atticus) about Tom's conviction. 'They've done it before and they did it tonight and they'll do it again and when they do it — it seems that only children weep.' The jury of distinguished adults couldn't reason as rationally as a child could and did.

The racial concerns that Harper Lee addresses in *To Kill a Mockingbird* began long before her story starts and continued long after. By sifting through the many layers of prejudice that Lee exposes in her novel, the reader gets a jest of the complex history of race relations in the South America at that time.

Another issue that she addresses in interracial wedding. The fear of interracial unions stemmed from the fear that African American men would rape and impregnate white women as a means of penetrating white society and white power. However, such crimes virtually never happened. However, this idiotic "rape complex" led to drastic and deadly results: Lynching became the primary means of dealing with any accusation of rape of a white woman that was pinned on a black man. In the story, when the mob comes to lynch Tom Robinson at the jail, Lee alludes to the reality of black men who lived on the receiving end of this inhumane treatment.

Apart from the issues of racial relations and the injustices that minority groups suffered, Harper Lee's novel is also a coming-of-age story, or *bildungsroman*. In such stories, the central character tends to move from a state of absolute innocence

to a mature state of mind because of suffering and surviving various misadventures. In *To Kill a Mockingbird*, Scout's biggest concerns is coming to terms with the expectations her society has for women. As per records, in the 1930s, women in the South were pressured to conform to a widely held ideal of "Southern womanhood." Women were, more often than not, treated as delicate, fragile creatures, and were expected to act in accordance with that treatment. Scout is anything but delicate and fragile, and a good deal of the story focuses on her attempts to fit into a world that expects tomboys to wear frilly dresses and maintain a dainty disposition.

In conclusion, the novel's title is a metaphor for both men, each of whom is a mockingbird; fighting to get out of their cages: be it fitting into a womanly image, escaping fake rape charges or innateness to social interactions. While some managed to escape, some got shot and some were forced to kill.



It isn't a book about a man seeking sympathy. It isn't a success story about a man who made it from rags to riches. It hardly is the story where a man found the love of his life.

However, what it is, is a story that celebrates life; all parts: good and bad. It is a story of unconditional companionship in the most unlikely situations.

Murakami in the Woods

"I will go deep in the woods From where no roads diverge And I would poke at an anthill To be instantly submerged"

Isn't this relatable? Any human being who has lived long enough to understand what life is, has wished for an escape at some point in their life. But how many of us have actually reached that threshold to actually give up?

The world isn't a happy place and not every human is optimistic about it. Yet, life is all about finding that silver lining in the gloomy cloud. The question, however, remains whether everyone is able to find it?

Murakami in the Woods beautifully explores the contrasting human nature; of the giver and the taker, the optimist and pessimist, the one who made it and the one who got away. The highlight of the story lies in the simplicity and sophistication with which the author is able to link a forest with life; how both of them grow, change paths and get rid of the dead to pave way for the living. Yet, there is something familiar about them which forces you to make an effort to explore it more, perhaps in hopes of finding that peace we run after.

The story begins with some nostalgic feelings of the narrator towards rain, cigarette and his love, Murakami. Co-incidentally (not) both, the rain and cigarette, take him back to Murakami. He recalls her as the love of his life and yet someone he could never completely figure out. Maybe that is what drew him towards her in the first place. After all, humans tend to find beauty in all that is broken. The sense of accomplishment that they get after they've somehow 'fixed' something or somebody is parallel to none. However, we forget one thing: Broken people and broken things are not the same. Broken humans need to heal. They don't need to be fixed.

Did the narrator understand this? Perhaps not.

While the story talks about optimism of the narrator and how he somehow found the will to live again, metaphorically; the story fails to explain the other spectrum of human behaviour.

The narrator and his muse were different at a very basic level, and that difference can be understood just by comparing their views towards the tree planted by their window. While the narrator believed it to be a symbolism of their relationship, Murakami saw it as an unnecessary whim. The narrator's obsession with the tree to grow, somehow, made him forget that he needs to nurture it as well.

As a reader, even without much details about her, I could relate to Murakami more. She is painted in shades of being aloof and unattached, but was she? Consider this, while she would never openly claim her love for the narrator, her love was evident in smaller actions; like asking the narrator to be with her when they climaxed or when she nonchalantly said that they make a perfect pair because she was lost and he knew how to find the way.

Murakami might have tried to be a better person for the narrator but knowing herself, she always maintained a charade because of the fear that she might disappoint him. Her leaving him 'just like that' might seem like a spontaneous decision to the narrator, but to a troubled soul like Murakami's, it must have been deliberated over and over again. She understood that narrator couldn't accept his defeat, that he wouldn't be able to understand what the problem was and thus, walked away.

This left me with the question: Was it really Murakami or the narrator that needed to be saved?

The story ends with the narrator, somehow, finding Murakami in an anthill. And as she draws her last breath, she hands over a glowing seed back to narrator. In a beautiful manner, the author showcases that finally our narrator decided to move on; let go of his doubts and questions for the truth was that Murakami was long gone. And perhaps it was time that he moved ahead with his life as well and bury Murakami in the woods, thus, finding the peace he searched for.

As a reader, I hope he does. And so, does Murakami.
