for you to come along.





SOME OF THE MOST DECORATED INDIAN SWIMMERS

1. Shamsher Khan



We will start off the list with one of the greatest Indian swimmers of all time, Shamsher Khan, born in 1933. He is the first Indian Swimmer to take part in the Olympics, achieving the feat in the 1956 Summer Olympics.

This came as no surprise after he made a national record in a 200-meter Butterfly event in 1954. Also in the year 1955, Shamsher became the first to break the then-existing national record at the national meet in Bangalore. A member of the Indian National Army, Shamsher also participated in the 1962 Indo-China War and the 1971 Indo-Pak War. Khan soon retired in 1973 after all his achievements in both the army and swimming. The legend died on 15 October 2017.

2. Arati Saha



Another great swimmer in early India, Arti Saha was a long-distance swimmer. Born in British Indian West Bengal's capital city of Calcutta in September 1940, she started swimming at the young age of four.

In 1959, Saha became the first Asian woman to swim across the English Channel. She is also the first Indian female athlete to be conferred with the Padma Shri Award in 1960.

3. Bhakti Sharma



Born on 30 November 1989, Bhakti Sharma is an Indian Open water swimmer. She is the youngest woman ever to set a record in open swimming in the Antarctic waters. Also making her the first Asian woman to achieve the feat.

Sharma swam 2.3 km in 41mins 14secs in freezing water at a temperature of 1°C. Bhakti has successfully broken the record of Lynne Cox (USA) and Lewis Pugh (Great Britain), after swimming in all five oceans of the world. Apart from the five oceans, she has also swum in the eight other channels and seas. Owing to her extraordinary feats, Bhakti is also a recipient of the TenzingNorgay National Adventure Award.

4. Virdhawal Khade



Viradhawal Khade is probably the best-known modern Indian Swimmer. Hailing from Kolhapur, Maharashtra, Virdhawal is an Arjuna Awardee of 2011. He represented India in the 2008 Beijing Olympics.

In 2010, India won the first Olympic medal in 24 years, thanks to Virdhawal's bronze in the 50m Butterfly category.

4. Sajan Prakash



Sajan Prakash is famously known as the 'Michael Phelps' of India. Born on 14 September 1993, he represented India at the 2016 Rio Olympics in the 200m Butterfly race. This came after Prakash overwhelmed everyone by winning 6 gold and 3.

Silver medals at the 2015 National Games in Kerala. The 26-year-old has also won 1 gold, 2 silver, and 3 bronze in the Asian Age Group at Tashkent in 2017. He is currently training with the Railways team in Bengaluru.

As a competitive swimmer myself, swimming taught me much more than just to move easily through the water. As Eliud Kipchoge said, "Only disciplined in life are free", swimming taught me to stay disciplined in life as it is not easy to wake up super early in the morning and go for a long practice. Swimming taught me to push my limits. It taught me to look deeper, work hard and grow as a human being.



If you are a parent, do you ask for consent from your pre-teen child before hugging, bathing, or changing their clothes? Do you ask for consent from your younger sibling merely to hug them?

These questions might be baffling or even throw a person offguard, but they have an immensely comprehensible answers. In India, five children are sexually abused every hour. Victims of these heinous crimes are left with nothing but persistent impressions of trauma, which have a tremendous chance of projecting themselves in unhealthy or self-destructive ways in adulthood.

Children possess an undeveloped, impressionable minds. Consequently, their trauma goes unprocessed, and they internalize those emotions. Therefore, it is of utmost importance to equip children with the correct knowledge regarding the subject of Child Sexual Abuse (whether it's about private body parts, consent, and safe and unsafe touch). At this d age, it is essential for adults and caretakers to inculcate this practice and normalize consent.

We expect fellow adults to respect our boundaries. But it is very easy to overlook a child's boundaries or discomfort. When youngsters are forced to embrace relatives or family members against their will, it teaches them that it doesn't matter if they don't want to be touched. This unknowingly misguided habit might make it more difficult for them to say no when faced with an unsafe touch. There are myriad ways to educate children about consent.

Asking a child before initiating physical contact helps them perceive the importance of their consent and accommodates a sense of authority, they hold over their own body. This habit might be trivial, but it plays a valuable role in normalizing consent, preventing CSA, and creating a safe environment for children. Like an adult, a child can rightfully resist physical contact even if its intentions are purely harmless.

Going back to the questions that were initially asked, it's high time we ponder upon this issue and incorporates this parenting or caretaking technique that prepares children even in the most unpredicted situations.



Upliftment of women in society??

The upliftment of women is not a new concept. It can be seen in various ideologies, such as feminism, which includes a range of socio-political movements and beliefs that strive to define and establish the political, economic, personal, and social equality of genders.

In India, the approach to women's upliftment is different. For instance, women's bus tickets are waived off in government buses (DTC and cluster buses) in the capital city of Delhi. The first coach of the Delhi Metro is reserved for ladies. At the time of admission, the cut-off for girls is decreased compared to boys. Moreover, various educational institutions are established especially for girls in almost every state. These actions raise the question, "Do women really need these privileges when both genders have equal rights (at least on paper)?"

Such questions are raised when incidents like the Lucknow girl repeatedly slapping a cab driver (in August 2021) are reported. It is then asked whether it is beneficial to offer these many advantages to a particular gender in the name of upliftment.

However, the answer is different. It cannot be said about women's situation globally in the current scenario since India is just one country with diverse races, colors, and cultures. The majority of India's population is rural, and when visiting states like Bihar, which is considered the cradle of Indian civilization, one can see that men in these states are not comfortable with their wives working outside the home; it is considered shameful in rural areas. Although women have equal rights on paper, these rights are not as robust as they appear on paper.

In politics, women are mostly treated as figureheads, and their husbands do the actual work. Even highly intelligent girls are given social responsibilities at a young age, and they are expected to do housework in addition to their professional duties.

These factors remind us that there is still a long way to go for the overall upliftment of women in Indian society. However, in regions like the European Union and the United States, women are more independent than in other regions like Africa, the Middle East, and South Asia. Women's upliftment in India is still necessary, and it is a slow but worthwhile process.







And I immediately knew what to do when you asked "will you marry me?"


Not long after that, we got married with the blessings of our families and friends Took an oath that day to have each other's back till our story ends by

शास्त्रीय नृत्य untaught and unlearned

What comes to your mind when you think about Indian classical dance? How many classical dance forms can you name? Generally, people state two names, Bharatnatyam and Kathak. I'm an Odissi dancer. A lot of students questioned me about my dance form. Only two seniors knew about Odissi. Among others, some were eager to know, some just said it's the same as Bharatnatyam.

How can I blame them? They are untaught.

Indian classical dance or Shastriya Nritya is an umbrella term for various performance arts rooted in Hindu musical theatre styles, whose theory and practice can be traced to the Sanskrit text Natya Shastra. Nine classical dance forms of India are Bharatanatyam, Kathak, Kuchipudi, Odissi, Kathakali, Chhau, Sattriya, Manipuri, and Mohiniyattam.

Here's a concise route for you to explore classical dances further. Bharatnatyam which originated in Tamil Nadu was kept alive by the devadasis, who were young girls gifted by their parents to the temples and who were married to the gods.

Kathak, originating from Uttar Pradesh, consolidates legends from antiquated folklore, particularly from the life of Lord Krishna turned out to be very famous in the courts of North Indian kingdoms.

Kuchipudi is indigenous to the state of Andhra Pradesh. It originated in the 17th century with the creation of Sidhyendra Yogi of the dance drama Bhama Kalapam, a story of Satyabhāma, the charming but jealous wife of the god Krishna.

Odissi, emerged in Odisha is often argued against Bharatanatyam as odissi dancers often assert that it is the oldest of the Indian classical dances, drawing the Natyashastra to underscore their claim. It is traditionally a dance drama genre of performing art and particularly Lord Jagannath is worshipped.

Manipuri, one of the main styles of Indian Art of Classical Dance originated in the picturesque and secluded state of Manipur in the north eastern corner of India. This dance is associated with rituals and traditional festivals in praise of Lord Krishna.

Sattriya dance emerged in Assam. This neo-Vaishnava treasure of Assamese dance and drama has been , for centuries nurtured and preserved with great commitment by the Sattras i.e Vaishnava maths or monasteries..

According to a Puranic story, Lord Vishnu took on the guise of a 'Mohini' to seduce the Asuras , both in connection with churning of the ocean and episode of the slaying of Bhasmasura. Mohiniyattam literally interpreted as the dance of 'Mohini', the celestial enchantress of the Hindu mythology, is the classical solo dance form of Kerala.

Recently, Chhau has been added to this list by the cultural ministry of India. It is mainly performed during festivals in the region of Jharkhand, West Bengal and Odisha. Masks form an integral part of Chhau dance in Purulia and Seraikella styles.

The point is that culture has been around for a long time and not just in our species. It defines us, and without it, we would wander hopelessly with no umbrella to shield ourselves.


